As I write I am conscious that the Corps continues to have some 300+ soldiers deployed in Afghanistan from 10 Sig Regt, 14 Sig Regt (EW), 15 Sig Regt (IS), 18 Sig Regt, 21 Sig Regt, 30 Sig Regt and 7 Armd Bde HQ and Sig Sqn (207). We remain immensely proud of their achievements and quite rightly our thoughts should be with them, and their families.


The last year has seen the start of a period of significant change for the Corps and the Army. I am pleased to report that we are well positioned to grapple with these challenges. Most notably work on the future structure of the Corps has continued apace over the last year, and we now have a clear vision of our future Reserve Structure complimenting the announcement made in Army 2020 last year. While a good deal of additional work is still required, we now know that our Reserves will be made up of 4 regiments plus our specialists in the Land Information Assurance and Land Information Communication Services Groups. The Regiments have now joined 10 and 15 Sig Regts in the newly formed 2 Signal Group as part of 11 Signal Brigade.



The detail of our future reserve structure is shown below together with a complete "wiring diagram" of our future ORBAT. This includes the soon to be formed 7th Signal Group:

Personnel

We are also facing considerable personnel challenges as we move towards our future structures, not least the recruiting of both Regular and Reserve. A major contributing factor to the difficult recruiting environment is undoubtedly the Army's continuing redundancy programme and just over 400 soldiers from R SIGNALS and QGS were selected for Tranche 3 redundancy last summer. No further redundancies are required, and our focus is now very much on recruiting and retaining both our regulars and our reserves. That said I am pleased to report that despite the difficult recruiting environment, the quality of the young men and women joining the Corps remains at an all time high and we will work hard to maintain this through 2014.

You will also be aware of the recent announcement regarding the future of Army Music. For the Corps Band It will mean a significant change, and they will leave Blandford for a new location in the West Midlands in 2014. In the short term this will mean some loss of capability as the reorganisation takes place, but from a cap badge perspective, the longer term outcome of our own band, located within the Corps' future Centre of Gravity, under command of 11 Signal Brigade is strongly endorsed and will reap huge benefits.

Sport

Once again the Corps has excelled in its sporting endeavours and as I write we are the Inter Corps champions in Orienteering, Golf, Football, Snow Boarding, Ladies Basketball, Water Polo, Canoe Sprinting and Open Water Swimming. Across the Corps sport and adventurous training continue to play a huge part in building our first class team ethos, and I am sure you will join me in congratulating all our sports men and women for all of their outstanding achievements.

Looking Ahead

While restructuring will doubtless continue to be the drumbeat, in the short term I am confident that we are well placed to deal with these and the future challenges of contingency. As ever our officers and soldiers continue to perform exceptionally, be it on operations, in barracks, on the sports field or on adventurous training. We have every right to be particularly proud of their achievements and look forward with anticipation to 2014.

CORPS SPORTING ACHIEVEMENTS 2013

The Corps' team sports have remained highly competitive throughout 2013 with weekly reports being received of their success, in particular the Royal Signals Orienteering team who wiped the board at the Inter-Corps Champions by taking all the silver home, and then the Royal Signals Badminton team who were awarded runners up at the Inter-Corps Championships after narrowly missing out on pole position during an intensely close competition. However, a special mention must go to the Corps Basketball team (Male and Female) and Corps Swimming / Water Polo team which have been extremely well supported by both the players and are each set to achieve some outstanding results throughout 2014. Team sports have also been actively encouraged and supported throughout the year to attend overseas tours. 2013 has seen teams visit places such as the French Alps, Antigua, Cyprus, Northern Europe and shortly the West Indies.

Outstanding individual successes have also been high on the 2013 agenda with awards and recognition being given to individuals such as **LCpl Robinson** (Army Squash Campion), **Cpl Looker** (3rd Place in Army Snowboarding), **Maj Guest** (Army Cycling Champion), **Maj Jeffery** (Army Cycling Captain), **SSgt Morris** (Army Cross Country Champion), **Cpl Storey** and **Cpl Dand** (GB Parachuting) and **Sig Kitching** (Inter-Services Swim Champion).

Reports from some of the individual Corps Team Sports Secretaries;

KAYAKING / CANOE

From the outset the 2013 has been a busy year within Corps Marathon paddling. 14 Signal Regiment (EW) submitted a squad to compete in the Devizes to Westminster Canoe Race. This was a shrewd move and R SIGNALS Canoe Club (RSCC) resources were put into the mix to help bring this endeavour every success. RSCC retained the Waterside Series Services Trophy with a different crew from last year, and two R SIGNALS crews successfully completed the very eventful Devizes to Westminster Canoe Race in what was the coldest on record with a 40% drop out rate. As predicted at the last Sports Board meeting the Royal Engineers have attempted to re-establish their prior dominance on the







back of restarting their annual 3 months long Devizes to Westminster (DW) training camp. The sprint/marathon training camp and championship again took place in Bradford upon Avon, building on last year's successful format. This ultimately led to four new paddlers representing the Corps in the Army Championships. A further three personnel were invited to attend the Inter-Services championships as part of the Army Canoe Union development squad.

CLAY TARGET SHOOTING

R SIGNALS soldiers and officers now have a greater opportunity to participate in what has become the fastest growing non-contact sport in the Army. Clay Target Shooting in the R SIGNALS has grown considerably over the last few years under the support of the Army Target Shooting Club (ATSC). The Corps have 3 of its own fully established shooting grounds with another being built in Colerne with 21 Signal Regiment. Along with numerous other Army grounds, the sport is becoming ever more popular within the Corps and across the Army.

R SIGNALS soldiers are initially introduced to the sport during Phase 2 Training at Blandford. 'Sport for All' sees around fifteen Phase 2 soldiers shoot on a Wednesday afternoon with qualified Clay Pigeon Shooting Association (CPSA) instructors.

A number of R SIGNALS shooters are in the Army team, competing in the Armed Forces and Emergency Services League Events, achieving excellent scores at some of the best civilian shooting grounds in the country. In 2013 the Corps sent three individuals to attended the Army Clay Target Shooting tour to South Africa. The year saw many successes for the Corps; R SIGNALS came 3rd in the Army Inter-Corps Championships; Blandford Garrison came 2nd in the Army Unit Championships and there were many individual victories throughout the season with strong potential for 2014.

CROSS COUNTRY

R SIGNALS soldiers and officers have various opportunities to participate in cross country throughout the year. There are the Regional Command Leagues, Regional Command Championships, Corps Championships, Army Championships, Inter-Corps Championships and the very best in the Army go to the Inter-Service Championships. The season runs from October through March and is one of the most highly contested sports in the Army.

The Corps runs two training camps per year in the Lake District (Exercise KESWICK RUNNER). The first camp run in November is open to all abilities and soldiers are taught the fundamentals of running in a relaxed environment. There has been a fantastic programme developed over the years and it is extremely well supported by instructors from the RAPTC.

The second camp is generally run sometime in January/February and caters for the more advanced runners. It is designed to prepare athletes for the Inter-Corps Championships, which the Corps has had a successful history in, fielding junior, senior, female and veteran teams.

RUGBY

The R SIGNALS Rugby Club encompasses all facets of Rugby from across the Corps, including Rugby Union (Male and Female, 7s and 10s) and Rugby League. The Committee has been restructured in order to reflect this wide remit and now represents a solid foundation from which we will look to spread participation across the Corps and build for future success.

Rugby is the Army's premier collision sport and has a wide and very strong following from the grass roots through to international representation. At the Corps level rugby has grown in strength and quality and the Royal Corps of Signals has continued to compete at the highest levels in both codes with an increasing number of players representing the Army and Combined Services. In recent years there has been a constant battle with heavy operational commitments, the associated need for extensive specialist training, and training support for operations and contingency, alongside a reduction of our numbers in line with Army restructuring. Against this backdrop, unit level rugby has suffered and we are now rebuilding through 3 key Inter Unit competitions: the



Hall Cup, which is a structured league played after the Army Inter Unit Competitions; the 10s Festival (The Collins Cup) which is played at the start of the season and the 7s Festival in the Summer. We also now have 8 units who enter the Army Championship and Community Cup Competitions with a view to building towards entering a unit into the Premiership once operational commitments allow.

SQUASH

R SIGNALS squash is very strong at the moment with players representing Army squash at all levels. In the last 5 years the Corps has won the Army Inter Corps Championships, produced 2 Army Individual Champions, Army Under 25 Champions and now an Army Novice Champion. The Corps represent the Army team, not only at first team level but also at Under 25 and Veteran. Players have been selected for Army squash tours to South Africa, Australia, Switzerland, Gibraltar, Cyprus





and Hong Kong. The R SIGNALS has had its own tour in Gibraltar with a mixed team of strong players but also two novice players, one of whom has gone on to become Army Novice Champion. The Corps Championships is held in November (venue varies from year to year) usually with an excellent turnout depending on operational commitments. The competition caters for the accomplished player, the novice player and the more senior player with various age category events.

SNOWBOARDING

Snowboarding is one of the fastest growing winter sports in the Army and this year the Royal Signals has trained more people than any other cap badge. Of all the winter sports, this is probably the one that is most attractive to the younger members of our Corps, both soldiers and officers alike. It is probably the easiest winter sport to pick up, with novices quickly gaining their feet and tackling the more challenging conditions faster than their brethren sporting more traditional 'planks'.

Snowboarding has a very trendy, but also very tough and physically demanding

appeal, and our soldiers see it as a sport that is easily accessible to everyone. In 2013, over 120 members of the Corps, from Signaller to Lt Col participated in Ex MERCURY SNOWRIDER, easily matching skiing in popularity and next year we aim to train even more. With so many joining in, both novices as well as seasoned veterans, we are already competing at Army level, in both male and female categories and the Corps Team are the current Army Snowboarding Champions.

BASKETBALL

Basketball is one of the world's most popular and widely viewed sports and in recent years has seen a significant growth in popularity within the Corps. The quality of basketball played across the Army and within the Corps continues to develop with more competitions and training sessions played each year. Recent successes have seen the Corps retain the Female Champions title and we have seen a significant increase in the number of Corps personnel representing the Army and Combined Services.

The Army Inter Corps Competition is held annually (1st/2nd week Nov). The Corps takes two male teams and a female team to the competition. The Corps squad prepare for this event the week preceding the competition.

FOOTBALL

The R SIGNALS Football Association has been an integral participant in Inter-Corps football from the onset and has been continuously linked with the Quadrangular tournament since its inauguration over 40 years ago. Despite its position as one of the major Corps sides, triumph in the Quadrangular Tournament was limited to 3 successes in the competition in 1970 and 2001. Following a near miss in 2001 there was a sense that the Royal Signals were on the verge of something special. The past decade has seen spectacular success, and the Royal Signals Football Team has put in a strong



performance in both the Quadrangular tournament and the Massey Trophy on a consistent basis. The Corps went on to win 5 Quads in a row (2003-2007), a feat that almost matched the REME's 6-in-a-row in the early years of the competition (1969-1975). Likewise in the Inter-Corps League (Massey Trophy); having not won its first title until 2002-2003 the R SIGNALS have subsequently gone on to win 7 league titles and now have more championship wins to their name than any other Corps, having first equalled and then surpassed the Sappers' total of 5. A recent gap of 2 seasons without a league title was ended in 2013 as the Corps clinched the title on the last day of the season following on from a spectacular 10th triumph in the

Quadrangular Tournament.

ATHLETICS

The Corps has had 8 individuals selected to represent the Army through the season at competitions v Lougborough University and the Police. Seven individuals have been selected for the next Inter-Services Championships.

In the upcoming year there will be training camps and sessions being held at Blandford Camp and Bath University.









ROYAL SIGNALS ASSOCIATION CHAIRMANS REPORT

It seems only 5 minutes since I became Chairman of the Association at the Annual General Meeting, but in truth nearly a year has flown. Where has the time gone? It seems to have been a year dominated by the weather – a glorious summer followed by rain, rain and yet more rain. My heart goes out to those who have been affected by the flooding whilst being grateful that none of our major RSA events have been disrupted. I knew there was a good reason Blandford Camp was built on the top of a hill!

Within the Corps and wider Army, it has continued to be a time of change. The drawdown from Afghanistan is well under way and we are most thankful that, at the time of writing, no members of the Corps have been killed in action in the last year. Another drawdown is also well in train with our final pull-out from Germany due later in the decade. This will leave a largely UK-based Army, focussed on capability, rather than a specific operation or threat. This will be a very different Army from the one in which most members served. The future shape of the Territorial Army (now renamed the Army Reserve) has also been announced, sadly seeing the loss of yet another Regimental Headquarters, with the demise of 38th (Strategic Communications) Signal Regiment. One thing that will remain constant, however, will be our people. I am certain that you would all recognise in the current and next generation of signallers the same characteristics (and characters) with whom you served.



The Blandford Reunion followed its traditional pattern and I am most grateful to all those in HQ Royal Signals, Blandford Garrison and 11th Signal Regiment who made it such a success. From this summer the Reunion will lead into a week of Corps activities in Blandford, including the Morrison Cup. So if you'd like to extend your stay in Dorset, there will be much to see and enjoy. We hope in 2015 to bring together on the same day the Princess Royal Day Parade of serving personnel with the Veterans' March Past, but more of that once the RSMs have worked out how to do it!

The Rededication Service of the Corps Memorial in the National Memorial Arboretum goes from strength to strength with record numbers attending in 2013. My thanks to 37th Signal Regiment and the South Staffordshire Branch for bearing the brunt of the organisation once again. Some of you will have noticed that there are one or two problems with the Memorial itself. Somehow rust stains had mysteriously appeared on a non-ferrous statue; the manufacturer has now investigated, accepted responsibility and is putting right at their own expense. We're also investigating the stone on which the plinth stands, as it simply does not seem to be up to the extremely wet conditions and poor on-site drainage (see my earlier comments on the weather).

Another event which is going from strength to strength is Project Noel, centred upon a Service of Lessons and Carols in the splendid surroundings of Liverpool Anglican Cathedral. With the sad demise after 25 years of the London Service, this is now our only Association-wide Carol Service and I do encourage you to experience its unique atmosphere in 2014. Meanwhile we continue to reach out to all members, in whatever way best suits their needs. The Facebook community is now by a long, long way our largest "branch", we have a "flashmob" meeting regularly in York and we're in discussion to affiliate the Linked-In Community "Jimmy in Business" to the Association. I hope that this diverse approach will draw the Corps family closer together with something for everyone.

Finally may I thank everyone in RHQ for their help and support during my first year as Chairman. General Robert Baxter has been a tower of strength as our President and I wish him and Gwynedd all joy and happiness as he retires as Master. I equally welcome General Nick Pope to his new role and look forward to working with him and Jo. Colonel Graham Norton and Amanda have been brilliant ambassadors for the Corps and his commitment to uniting serving and retired members has been second-to-none (dare I suggest more so than many SO-in-C(A) managed). The Corps RSM, Mark McMullen, may have had a baptism of fire judging the Standard Bearers' competition at his first Reunion weekend, but has since proved to be an inspirational leader and just the right man for the job; I wish him and Rosie well on his well-earned commissioning and welcome WO1 Luke as his successor. Closer to home, many of you will be aware that our Regimental Secretary, Terry Canham, has been seriously ill this winter. He is now (touch wood) recovering well and I am sure I speak for us all in wishing him a full and speedy return to full health. This of course has increased the burden on both our Assistant Regimental Secretary, Mark Tivey, and our Admin Officer, Caroline Addison. I owe a huge debt of gratitude to them and everyone else for keeping the Association in such good health.

Royal Signals Association Legal Status

Introduction

At the 2013 AGM the General Secretary described the background to the disconnected relationship, in modern legal terms, between the RSA and the main financial and charitable arm of the Corps, the Royal Signals Benevolent Fund. The issue goes back a long way – as far as 1982 to be exact. Over the last couple of years, we have restructured the Benevolent Fund under its corporate trustee, the Royal Signals Trustee Ltd. We now need to tackle the legal status of the Association.

The Problem

In 1982 the then Central Committee established the Royal Signals Benevolent Fund (RSBF) by a trust deed and made the entirely sensible decision to transfer all the Association's funds to the newly established RSBF. In 1997 the Charity Commission made a fully regulating scheme which replaced the trust deed. The RSBF, rather than the RSA, is thus responsible for the payment of grants to meet the welfare needs of members of the Corps (whether serving or retired) and to foster comradeship and morale within the Corps through the subsidy of activities and events, such as the Reunion Weekend. For financial purposes, the RSA and RSBF have in effect been run for the last 30 years as though they were a single organisation, with any funds received by the RSA being immediately transferred to the RSBF.

Unfortunately, we have been advised that this approach does not comply with modern Charity Law. As the RSA is a membership organisation with a charitable intent, the law would now recognise it as an independent, unregistered charity. This brings a whole range of issues with it, such as the Central Committee assuming the duties, responsibilities and liabilities of Trustees of the Charity, and the necessity of maintaining and auditing separate accounts. This would drastically increase the workload on our small team in Blandford and increase costs. It is not therefore a route down which I would willingly take us.

The Options

We have therefore been forced to consider a number of options for restructuring the RSA. These have included:

- Formally registering and operating the RSA as a separate charity;
- Disbanding the current RSA and re-forming it as a membership organisation within the RSBF;
- Winding up the RSBF and reverting to a structure not dissimilar to the pre-1982 model; and
- Merging the RSA and RSBF. RSTL would be the Corporate Trustee of the "merged" charities.

We have measured each of the options against five main criteria:

- To be fully compliant with current charity law.
- To protect welfare funds within the RSBF model, including any future income from legacies.
- To protect the RSA Central Committee from Trustee Liability.
- To retain the existing membership, area and branch structures.

- To minimise changes to the membership, so that the transition takes place without impact on RSA affairs and without increasing the administrative burden of running the Association.

The Proposal

Against these criteria, there is a clear favourite: to merge the charities by what is known as a "cy prés" scheme. However, to achieve this we will need to make some changes to our current rules as well as gaining the agreement and consent of the Charity Commissioners. The two most significant changes we will need to make are:

- The Charitable Object. In order to merge, both the RSA and RSBF must have the same charitable purpose or object. This does not require any radical changes, but it will require some paraphrasing of the current objects of both the Association and the RSBF. It is proposed that in future our object should be:



a. To promote and maintain the efficiency and morale of the Royal Corps of Signals.

b. To prevent poverty and relieve conditions of need, hardship and distress of Signallers and their families and dependants and the families and dependants of deceased Signallers.

[Within this proposal, "Signallers" is defined as past and present members of the Corps, of the Indian Signal Corps before the partition of India in 1947, past members of the Signal Service Royal Engineers and past members of the ATS, WAC(I) and WRAC who served in communications appointments with the Corps. It also includes officers and soldiers of Queen's Gurkha Signals, except for welfare grants covered by the Gurkha Welfare Trust,]

- Role and Powers of the Membership. The Membership will continue to act as the "ears" of the merged charities in identifying past and present members of the Corps in need of welfare support. Within the new structure, the Membership will also continue to vote on the election of a Central Committee, which will act as a sounding board for all matters of concern to the members. These include the organisation of, and attendance at, memorial services, reunions and other Corps events. The Central Committee will not, however, be trustees. That role will be taken by RSTL, as the merged charity's Corporate Trustee. The Membership will not vote on the appointment of Directors of RSTL, which will remain the responsibility of the Master of Signals and the Corps' Financial Controller.

Conclusion

I realise that change can be uncomfortable and unsettling, but I am convinced that the above proposal represents the best way to take the Association forward, both legally and sustainably. Once the changes have been put in place, there should be little discernible impact upon the day-to-day operation of the RSA or to you as its members. I will be delighted to answer any questions you may have at the Association's AGM next month. In particular, I would welcome your views on the proposed change to the objects clause, the membership proposal and the merger itself. I would of course also be pleased to receive your thoughts in writing or by e-mail, especially if you are unable to attend the AGM yourself.

ROYAL SIGNALS ASSOCIATION ADMIN OFFICERS REPORT



The Association membership is growing and in the ten months since the last Newsletter there have been 1,213 new members and 350 replacement cards sent to existing members. Of the new members, 650 were enrolled from the retired Corps, 476 while undergoing Phase II training and 87 while serving. If you would like a new card, or replacement lapel badge, do contact me. 

Act of Remembrance at Glossop The AFSA newsletter gave details about six members of 2 AFS who perished when *HMT Lancastria* was sunk off St Nazaire on 17 June 1940. To our surprise these six young men all came from Glossop and we eventually discovered that they had originally enlisted in 2nd North Midland Corps Signals (TA) at Glossop and were members of 14 Line Section, which was later transferred to 2 AFS. Those members of the section that survived rejoined 2 AFS at Harrogate and were then transferred to Western Command Signals. This tragic story was unearthed by **Philip Tice**, a member of the AFSA and also a member of 2 AFS who left St Nazaire on another ship on the day following the disaster.

WELFARE

As with the beginning of every New Year we all of us reminisce over the previous twelve months and judge whether they have been better or worse than before. Like me I'm sure you welcomed in 2014 with a desire for it to be kind to you and your loved ones and a promise that your Resolutions would make it past the second week of January! 2013 was a hard financial year for many with a freeze on wages and cuts in benefits. It never fails to amaze and sadden me how many people have to resort to charitable agencies to be able to pay for heating or food, something we would not expect to see in this day and age. Unfortunately, the continuing squeeze on our finances this year will be difficult for many, causing distress and concern. If you are aware of a former or present Signaller and their dependants who are in conditions of need, hardship or distress please remind them of our existence. All information on eligibility, types of assistance available and contact details can be found on the excellent RSA web-site: www. royalsignalsassociation.co.uk Basically initial contact should be made with SSAFA or the Royal British Legion (RBL) who then in turn will forward an application to the RSA Welfare for financial assistance.

We rely heavily on the casework carried out by SSAFA and the RBL to provide all

the relevant information upon which decisions can be made. If necessary we liaise with the ABF - The Soldiers Charity, The Officers' Association, the Royal Commonwealth Ex-Services League, Combat Stress, Veterans Agency and many more.

2013 saw a major overhaul of procedures within the RBL which has filtered down to us. Unfortunately we have seen a reduction in applications from the RBL which has resulted in a decrease of £100k in our grants compared to 2012. It is hoped that these back-logged cases will eventually make their way to us and we will be back to our usual level soon.

All applications are judged on their merits, but in all cases the question of *need* is the most significant factor. Timing is a very important factor when dealing with cases of need as we endeavour to deal with applications as quickly as possible. It is amazing how one grant at the right time can really make a difference to the quality of someone's life and their future. Grants are not made to individuals direct but through the sponsoring welfare organisation.


All cases for £600 and below are considered on a daily basis by our Assistant Regimental Secretary, Maj (Retd) Mark Tivey. Over the past twelve months the Royal Signals Benevolent Fund (regular and major grants) provided £293,994.60 of assistance to 556 applicants. These grants have been instrumental in providing 36 electric scooters, 3 stair lifts and 11 level access showers. There are numerous other types of assistance requested such as help with priority bills (rent or utilities), clothing, emergency house repairs etc.

Assistance over £601 up to the maximum of £1,200 is considered at the Major Grants Meetings (MG). The MG meetings take place once a month. Each meeting is attended by me (Linda) the Welfare Secretary, a Retired Officer, a serving Field Officer and a JNCO. The Retired Officer is selected from a list of nine volunteer

Chairmen who kindly give up their time once or twice a year to lead a meeting. Each attendee has the task of considering the applications and deciding the level of assistance they feel appropriate. We usually have an

average of 12 cases per meeting although it has been known to reach over 20 in busier periods. Our average spend (using the figures from Jan 2013 – Dec 2013) is £9,473 per meeting.

REPORT FROM THE ROYAL SIGNALS MUSEUM

More Than Just a Museum of Rusting Radios

The Royal Signals Museum is much more than a Museum of Rusting Radios as it has unkindly been called. Displaying equipment is an important part of our role as the Showcase of Corps Heritage and Ethos, but just as important are the stories of the men and women who used the equipment. Over the last year we are grateful to have been given or lent by family and friends medals, documents and memorabilia of some awe inspiring people. This has enabled us to tell some incredible stories. Amongst many kind donations and loans relating to the Second World War we have received items that allow us to tell stories of the following members of the Corps:



Major General Anthony Deane-Drummond was the second-in-command of a commando force which made a failed raid on southern Italy. He was captured by enemy forces, escaped from captivity, was recaptured, escaped again and eventually made his way back to England sixteen months after the raid. He later served with airborne forces and was captured at Arnhem, but successfully escaped for a third time. After the War he commanded 22 SAS Regiment in Malaya and Oman and held a number of staff positions, later commanding a division in BAOR before retiring.



Captain Eric Lomax was captured by the Japanese with the fall of Singapore and endured three and a half horrific years as a prisoner of war. His harrowing account of his experiences as a prisoner and as a veteran coming to terms with post traumatic stress disorder are captured in his book The Railwayman and in the film by the same name.



Captain Kenneth McKee served with the Second Army from D Day all the way through to Berlin. He was one of the first non-Russian troops into Berlin and acquired an amazing collection of Nazi artefacts. He was subsequently involved in setting up communications for the Potsdam Peace Conference.



Maj Gen Sir Roland Penney served as Signal Officer-in-Chief in the Middle East from 1941, as General Officer Commanding 1st Infantry Division from 1943 (taking part in the Anzio landings) and as Director of Military Intelligence at Headquarters Supreme Allied Command South East Asia from 1944 until the end of the war.



Major John Stanfield served in India and then with the S.O.E. in China. When the 47 Divisions of the Japanese Army in China officially surrendered to the Chinese Army he signed the surrender documents for the British Army.



Major General Victor Westropp served in France in the First World War, in the Punjab and Palestine between the Wars, as a Brigadier in General Eisenhower's HQ in Algiers and as Deputy Adjutant General in India under General Auchinlech. He was appointed President of the International Ravensbruck Concentration Camp Trial in Hamburg from December 1946 to 1947. Of the 16 prisoners in the Dock, he sentenced 11 to hanging and 4 to long imprisonment. One prisoner died during the trial.

Over the past few years the Museum has managed to fill in many of the gaps in its collection and the volunteers have worked tirelessly sorting, photographing and interpreting the many thousands of objects that we own. We are, however, still missing some key communications devices that played significant parts in the evolution of the Corps. For example we have only one component of the WAVELL system and only one piece of ECM equipment from OP BANNER. We are also desperate for photographs and stories from the early phases of the Corps' involvement in Iraq and Afghanistan.
