

Major Keith Pritchard

It is with great sadness that this edition of The Wire is being produced without the keen eye and expert hand of **Major** (**Retd**) **Keith Pritchard**, The Wire Editor, who passed away suddenly in January. Ironically, the February edition of the Wire was completed by **Keith** late in the afternoon of 20th January as he was due to attend a medical appointment the next day. Even during his last hours, he gave instructions that The Wire was to be out on time and it was for that reason that production was not delayed.

Keith Pritchard was born and educated in Hereford before attending the Royal Military Academy, Sandhurst and was commissioned into the Corps in 1974. One of his early achievements in life was that of being a proficient rugby player and it did not take long before he was playing both County Schoolboy and Army Junior level representative rugby. It came as no surprise that his first tour as a junior officer was with 7th Sig Regt where he also represented the Corps at the age of 19. **Keith** was proud to be a somewhat rebellious young officer and time on the rugby pitch was interspersed with time in the Duty Officers' Bunk making amends. He was keen to point out that this pretty much set the pattern for the early years of his career.

A short tour at Shrivenham saw the step up to him playing Army level rugby, and this continued throughout tours with 8 Sig Regt, 3 Armd Div Sig Regt and 30 Sig Regt. **Keith** joked that his lack of technical ability was well recognized by the Postings Branch and

he was set on the route of a number of Grade 3 and Grade 2 Weapons Staff appointments in MoD, the RSS and HQLF interspersed with tours in Northern Ireland, Bosnia, both UN and NATO, Kosovo and Sierra Leone. A 3-year tour followed in Saudi Arabia with the SANGCOM team prior to returning to DE&S, with a tour of Iraq in the middle, before finishing his career at HQ DCCIS/HQ RSS.

Having played rugby throughout his career, playing his final Corps match at the age of 40, **Keith** decided it was time to retire and take up a more leisurely pastime, which translated itself into skydiving, which unsurprisingly he discovered he was also very good at, until he was finally bitten by the golf bug. **Keith** was the lynch pin of Blandford Garrison Golf Society and throughout his time he enabled golf to be played by all soldiers either transiting through or stationed in Blandford Garrison. He also played a major role in Corps Golf where since 2009 he organised and managed the Spring and Autumn Golf Corps Championships. Despite being a keen and talented golfer he would have loved to have taken part in these competitions however he selflessly stood aside to undertake the organising. He was appointed as the Club Captain of Ashley Wood Golf Club, which was another of his defining achievements and this also stood to develop the relationship between the military and the civilian community. His sense of humour shone through in all he undertook and never more so in his sense of dress when attending golf meetings. His trademark coloured trousers became his forte and he imbued this sense of style on his reluctant fellow team mates.

Keith took over the role of Editor of The Wire in April 2010 where he transformed the publication into that we see today. It was clear to all those who knew and worked with **Keith** that The Wire was his passion and this was amply demonstrated by his approach to the very end. Having given 42 years Service to the Corps, we his Corps Family, friends and colleagues are all the better for having had **Keith** in our lives. We thank him for his Service, friendship and loyalty to the end – Certa Cito

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Report by the Corps Colonel

It has been another busy 12 months with the tempo and variety of operations remaining both significant and dynamic. With an escalation in activity across the Middle East and North Africa coupled with heightened readiness in the UK our soldiers and Officers remain as operationally committed as ever. Needless to say our soldiers are delivering where and when it matters and whether it has been helping to coordinate Defence's response to the Nepal Earthquake or supporting the relief effort in Cumbria the Corps remains right in the thick of it.

Our biggest challenge is recruiting and the forecast for the next 12 months is not good with both our CS Engineer and CS Operator trades forecasting a 50% shortfall against our Phase 2 training target. Recruiting is my Main Effort and whilst we will continue to support Army-wide recruiting initiatives I am continually looking for fresh ideas and broader support; this has to be a "team sport". On a positive note, work is now well underway to create the nucleus of a 4th QG SIGNALS Squadron in Stafford and I remain reassured by the genuine quality and outstanding professionalism that QG SIGNALS bring to the Corps. Officer recruiting also continues to hold its own and in a highly competitive market we are on track to meet our 15/16 targets.

The new Corps Assignment Policy, (PDo2) has now been issued. Routinely moving individuals every 2-4 years will no longer be the norm, and certainly where possible and operationally acceptable, we will attempt to reduce familial disruption by allowing individuals to be posted without having to move their

families; our concentration in Stafford will do much to help support this. Indefinite postings are now being gradually phased in. However, this is a policy that is still in transition and we will continue to keep it under review so as to ensure that our soldiers retain the best level of support that we can offer.

One of the highlights of last year was awarding Apprentice of the Year to Signaller Morris and encouraging personal/professional development will be one of my themes for 2016. Modern Apprenticeships, Masters Degrees, industrial attachments and cyber challenges will be promoted to try and maximise opportunity and enhance technical proficiency; we are a technical Corps. Work is also underway to continue developing our relationship with WCIT, IET, Bournemouth University and other professional bodies.

My predecessor did much to promote the integration of the Regular, Reserve and Retired cohorts; the 3 R's approach is paying real dividends and whilst we should do more to embrace our vibrant veteran community there is a genuine buzz around the RSA weekend and broader RSA activity. Project NOEL is developing into one of our key "drumbeat" activities in the North and it was genuinely inspirational to see so many sat down for dinner in the Adelphi Hotel last November; numbers were, however, slightly down on previous years so I encourage you to put the date (19 November 2016) in your diary now. Likewise our RSA weekend in Blandford continues to develop and the new Princess Royal day Parade format, which has included our veterans in the march past, is extremely popular. Whilst we were all sad to say farewell to Catterick as the location for our Corps "Northern" lunch, Stafford promises to be an excellent venue and planning is already underway to bring the 3 R's community together in September.

With 1, 16 and 22 Sig Regts now firmly ensconced in Stafford our footprint in Germany has all but gone. Elsewhere a delay to the move of 14 Sig Regt will mean that they remain in their current location for at least the next 3 years but I am delighted to report that our Corps Band is up and running in RAF Cosford. The Royal Signals Motorbike Display Team continue to be at the forefront of our recruiting effort and with their displays becoming ever more exciting I strongly recommend that you try and visit one of their events; they are a mightily impressive organisation.

Our Corps is in good health and whilst there is work to do I am confident that our officers and soldiers will continue to rise to the challenge. We will continue to do our utmost to promote the 3 R's construct whilst embracing our Corps motto. Our centenary is looming and with planning for our celebrations well underway it promises to be a cracking year. But in the shorter term there is still much to look forward to.

There as always are numerous highlights to mention, here are a few examples of what has been achieved. Although unofficial, a young Junior NCO smashed the Army high jump record by some margin at the last Morrison Cup. Now out of the Army Jonathan Dowle was rightly awarded the Outstanding Performance for 2015 at the recent Sports Person Dinner in Blandford. The Master of Signals, Lt Gen Pope completed the Devizes to Warminster canoe race, which as a novice was a real achievement. Another notable achievement was LCpl Hawkes who has become one of the youngest ever members of the Great Britain Judo Team.

Team sports as ever are getting more and more competitive, with the following notable achievements to report. The Corps dinghy sailing team emerged as the Inter-Corps winners for the fourth year in a row. The Corps indoor hockey team were also crowned the Inter-Corps champions. The previous winners of Sports Team of the Year, golf, found themselves for the third year in a row retaining the inter-corps championship title.

ALPINE SKIING

Alpine skiing at inter-unit level is thriving as the annual training camp and championships (Ex ALPINE MERCURY GLACIER) continues to host in excess of 100 racers, ably supported by a team of instructors and officials from across the Corps.



In the competition, the male individual championship was extremely hard fought between two new Royal Signals talented individuals; Sigs Nutt and Grand, with Sig Grand managing to secure the win overall. Likewise in the female competition LCpl Abel had an excellent season, finishing as the overall female winner at the Corps Championships.

At the higher lever, a number of Corps Units took part in the Divisional and Army Championships in Jan 15. Individuals who qualified for the Army Championships then formed the Corps Alpine Race Team. A particularly noteworthy performance came from Sig Grand who was placed 7th of 111 racers, and was selected for the Army team in his first season. Also, LCpl Abel was selected for the Army Ladies Team.

KAYAKING / CANOE

Royal Signals competition paddlesport has again had an increase in participation, with great results gained across all disciplines. Under the command of Capt Jeyes, surf is definitely on the up. With one training camp completed and a multiple training camp and competitive events forecast for next season, the future definitely looks bright.

The slalom team has achieved their best season to date, knocking the Royal Artillery from their decade long leading position. Well done to SSgt Richardson's and his core of 216 (Para) Sig Sqn paddlers. The Royal Signals achieved 5 of the top 10 positions at the Inter-Corps. Another notable accolade was Sgt Lawson of 22 Sig Regt racing up the national





rankings and gaining a 3rd in the K1 open. Sig Tranter has in his second season, moved on from the novice class and also finished in the top 10 at the Inter-Corps.

Our Corps flat water racing paddlers have again dominated all Army competitions, although after four years of winning all major trophies, the PARA team wrestled the sprint team trophy from the Corps. Strength in depth was demonstrated by 18 Sig Regt winning the Inter-Unit and saw the Royal Signals lifting the team trophy at the Army Descent Championships.

Race the Sun continued to be a showpiece for kayak racing with increased race boat entries. This again was an extremely competitive and hard fought leg at the front end with the four Army paddlers (two cap badges) coming home in the first four places.

The Army surpassed expectation in the blue riband event of UK paddlesport; the 125 mile Devizes to Westminster race. In the Services category first and fourth places were achieved by the Royal Signals crews who also made up two thirds of the scoring boats which enabled the Army to finally achieve the long sought after goal of winning the Open Team trophy. Lt Col King and LCpl Diaper demonstrated fitness, resilience and slick planning by succeeding to gain a second place in the overall Open competition, only twelve seconds outside their race plan after 18 hours and 12 seconds of graft.



CLAY TARGET SHOOTING

The Royal Signals Clay Target Championships were hosted at Brawdy in Pembrokeshire for the final time. With only a small further investment the new shooting ground for the Corps will be at Colerne in the future. This impending move however didn't detract from an excellent shoot with some outstanding results. The end of the competition saw the following results:

The Corps were also runners up at the Army Championships, with SSgt (YofS(EW)) Hamilton named ADS Outstanding Performer of 2015. More fantastic news was the five additional members of the Corps promoted from ADS to the Army Team. The pinnacle of which see's Maj Robinson of HQ Army appointed as the new Army Team Captain. This is a really outstanding achievement and coveted appointment within the shooting world.

Following a number of years without nominating a Corps Clay Target Team, an initiative, which involved the purchase of a new strip, saw the reinstatement of a nominated Corps Clay Target Team, which will only lead to improve the ethos, drive and development of the team.



CROSS COUNTRY

This report covers the major events of the Army's cross country competitive calendar for 2015. The season has seen a step-change in improvement by the Royal Signals. At the Inter-Corps Championships the Royal Signals won the junior men's competition and came third in the senior competition. This performance has built on improvements in recent years. The enduring trend remains that at unit level participation at the regional league events is very good with the Corps' units also taking an active part in hosting the races. In the past two years participation of athletes representing the Corps has improved and some notable new talent identified. Continuing to align the Corps Cross Country Championships closer to the inter-corps event alleviated some of the availability friction of old and identified key runners who were able to compete in the main events. Cross-country continues to be well supported from across all Royal Signals Units, this has led to a strong performance in the Inter-Corps Championships. Eight athletes represented the Army at the Inter-Service Championships, this is an excellent level of representation from one Corps alone. That said, the Corps still have more to offer and is determined to bring home more silverware from the event in the forthcoming seasons. 22 Sig Regt have developed a strong team of runners, dominating the Corps' Championships while concurrently winning the Midlands League and competing well at the Army Championships. Their dedicated training regime is paying off. Still a prestigious event, Ex KESWICK RUNNER continues to be a focus for concentrated training for the Corps' stronger runners and a development period for those more inexperienced athletes. The Sports Persons Dinner in Blandford saw Maj Jefferson become a joint winner of the Sports Official of the Year for her herculean dedication to Corps Cross Country and running a total of ten Ex KESWICK RUNNER.

TENNIS

As with most disciplines, our Corps teams go through peaks and troughs with uptake and personnel able to give one hundred percent dedication. There is a limited squad of players within the Corps but the good news is, it's slowly growing. With our first choice team managing to play every week, we would undoubtedly be successful in the Inter Corps Championships. The identification recently of two new high quality players at this year's Royal Signals Tournament will have a significant impact in the next few years. With the continued progress of our younger players we have identified a further four players who have the ability to progress into the Army Team. The Corps Tennis Singles Tournament was extremely successful, we saw the return of some of the Corps' excellent players and it has set us up nicely for the forthcoming winter season. The primary aim of this tournament is to highlight young, aspiring players who will in turn represent the Corps. Finally a Corps Tennis Tournament will take place in the forthcoming year.

SWIMMING

What a year the Royal Signals Swimming teams have had, with competitions aplenty, and fantastic results, you couldn't have hoped for a better year. All culminating in the Sports Team of the Year accolade being awarded to the Corps Swimming and Water Polo teams at the annual Sports Persons Dinner. The Royal Signals Inter-Unit Competition for 2015 was held in Aldershot and administered by 251 Sig Sqn, 10 Sig Regt. The event was held in an Olympic size pool with professional and official timing equipment and approx 70 swimmers from nine units.







The results of which were:

- 10 Sig Regt Winners Male Inter-Unit Competition.
- 11 (RSS) Sig Regt Winners Female Inter-Unit Competition.
- 30 Sig Regt Winners Inter-Unit Water-polo.

The next event in the Army swimming calendar is the Inter-Corps competition. Building on from a strong performance by the Corps in 2014 the team wanted to win more accolades. This was definitely achieved, the competition saw the Corps Men as the Inter-Corps swimming champions and the Inter-Corps Relay runners up. The Corps Ladies were the Inter-Corps swimming runners up and came third overall in the relay event. GOLF

Last year was a strong year for R Signals golf retaining the title of Army champions, which is the first time that the Corps team has retained the title in our history. So to be able to announce the Corps has done it again is a real pleasure. The Corps were also victorious in the majority of our fixtures; this was done as it was last year with a strong blend of novice and experience allowing maximum participation for all ranks.

The Corps also carried out a mini tour to La Manga in Spain. Eight of the Corps Golfers attended the tour in March of this year, which proved invaluable in their preparation towards the Army Championships.

The Inter Corps Championships follows on from the Individual Army Championships. This year proved to be the most successful individual competition for many years with Sig Morgan being narrowly beaten in the semi-final by the reigning Army Champion. Had he won, the final would have been all Royal Signals as Maj (TOT) Pace had progressed through to the final, sadly ending as runner up. This was a fantastic achievement given the quality of the opposition. Maj (TOT) Pace was further recognised as the most improved golfer at the awards ceremony.

Meanwhile in the Ladies event Sig Kirsty Kennedy of 21 Sig Regt was dominating her event and was crowned as the new Army ladies Champion. Due to a last minute reshuffle, the Corps were able to field an A Team and a B Team for the Inter Corps event. Fortunately, both teams were kept apart in the draw and although the B Team lost their initial match they were able to progress to the final of the plate competition.

The week proved to be hugely successful where R Signals dominated virtually every event throughout the week.

SQUASH

It has been an incredibly successful year for the Royal Signals Squash Team. As part of the Royal Signals Open Squash

Competition at Imphal Barracks, it was clear that recent investment in the players at unit level have produced some excellent young quality, with 11 (RSS) Sig Regt topping the competition. The top seven seeded were then selected to represent the Corps at the Army Inter-Corps Championships in Aldershot. The Royal Signals Corps Squash Team was settled in third place in the Inter-Corps Competition, this was mainly due to the number one and two seeded players being injured. This year only three corps players were able to represent the Army Squash Team on squash tours to Cyprus, Australia and Nepal.

The Royal Signals Squash Camp was held at Blandford Camp during September of 2015. It was an extremely well supported event, altogether 15 personnel from phase II training and 10 personnel from units around the Corps. The two days were a really worthwhile training camp, with the young and the corps team benefiting. The Royal Signals Open Squash Competition will also be held at the end of 2015, as with last year, the top seven players from the Royal Signals will be selected to represent the Corps team. The Corps Squash Team is still one of the strongest teams in the Army and has an excellent chance of repeating the success of previous years.



BOXING

The Royal Signals Inter-Unit competition was hosted this year by 30 Sig Regt in Bramcote. The end of the competition saw the Inter-Unit Champions being 30 Sig Regt for a third consecutive year, followed very closely by 3 Sig Regt. In all fifty six boxers from around the Corps entered the competition.

The Corps boxing camps, Ex BRAMCOTE BOXER (BB) Seven was attended by eighty six boxers and six coaches. This was an increase of thirty one individuals over previous training camps. This resulted in another increase of competitors within the Royal Signals Corps Boxing Championships to 56 boxers. Ex BB 8 was attended by seventy three boxers and they have begun to really concentrate on strengthening the Corps B Team. Overall we have seen an increase of 41 percent in attendance, this is great news for Corps Boxing

Further news from the Corps Boxing arena has seen the first trial ABA (GB) coaching course for both level one and two



coaching. This course was conducted at Bramcote by the ABA (GB) squad, twenty six members of the British Army qualified, including twelve Royal Signals representatives, another superb success.

The Corps achieved third position at this year's Army Boxing Championships, a great result when you consider there were three injuries to the team. The achievement was further highlighted by managing to still achieve success by having forty five percent of the finalists in the competition. We have also increased our footprint within the following areas, the Army, the Armed Forces (AF) and National sides. To really look in depth at the recognition that our Corps boxers have achieved you only need to look at the list below:

CRICKET

After a year of rebuilding and blooding new talent the Corps team reached the Semi finals of the fifty over Power Cup Competition and also reached the knock out stages of the T20 main competition. The standard of cricket around the Corps circuit has again been of a high standard, with eleven teams represented. There are probably three tiers within the Royal Signals Cricket Club (RSCC) hovering between top and middle third. They were beaten by the RLC in the fifty over format and the Infantry and Royal Engineers in the knock out stages of the T20 competition. These are all top third teams and represents an admirable performance for such an inexperienced team. It wasn't all bad news with notable



wins against the Adjutant Generals Corps, Royal Armoured Corps and Army Medical Services in competitive games. As well as victories against the Intelligence Corps, Welbeck and the Honourable Artillery Company in friendly fixtures. With the intent from the Chairman Corps sport to reach out into the public domain and play more fixtures against civilian opposition, the RSCC played two friendly fixtures against Cattistock Cricket Club and a First World War memorial fixture against Meriden Cricket Club. These games provided a great opportunity to represent the Corps and Army against civilian opposition and engage in a competitive but friendly environment. There will be return fixtures against both sides and they are planned for the 2016

season and RSCC will endeavour to look for more opportunities in line with the intent from Chairman Corps sport. Perhaps the biggest positive for the RSCC during the season was the fact that ten new players represented the club this year, although of varying standards there is definitely a new strength in depth and numbers to ensure longevity. With three level two coaches it is hoped that further development of the new players and the continued performance of senior players can ensure that the RSCC compete for honours in the years to come. The season culminated in a fitting Chairman's v President's fixture at Blandford Oval and then a presentation function at the Crown Hotel. Finally the RSCC was rightly granted permission to tour South Africa, a fantastic opportunity for all of the RSCC players.

KARTING



The Royal Signals Kart Team has entered its first year in the RAFMSA lead Inter-Service Endurance Championship. After purchasing a lone kart at the start of the year, trials were run at the Clay Pigeon Kart Circuit in order to select a team of four drivers. With twelve potential drivers turning up for the trials from various units across the Corps the following were selected to drive:

- Sgt Appleby 3 Sig Regt
- Cpl Culliford 21 Sig Regt
- SSgt Palmer 14 Sig Regt (EW)
- SSgt Earl 37 Sig Regt

This is a really good news story for a new corps discipline; all of the selected drivers bar one were complete novices that had never raced competitively before. The Championship was run from April until September, racing at six different circuits across the country. Amongst these were some of the best tracks available in the country.

As a new team they hoped to hold their own within the championship. With over forty karts on the starting grid at most races and race lengths varying between 2.5 Hrs and 4 Hrs it will not be an easy job. Although there are many established teams on the grid, it's fair to say that the team was competitive with the mid field having our best result of sixteenth out forty at Fulbeck. Finishing twenty fourth out of forty in the military team championship certainly provides a good framework to build on for the next season.





FOOTBALL

With a large number of teams it is easier to break down the Royal Signals Football Association in to the following categories:

(a) Male Team

The new season started off really well with a pre-season tour to Cyprus. A total of forty four soldiers, twenty eight from the male team and eighteen from the female team competed in a total of six games. The male team won all four of their fixtures, notably beating a Combined Service Cyprus XI. During the season approximately thirty four players were used and they were enabled by eight supporting staff, be that coaches or administration. The team finished fourth in the Massey Trophy League and were narrowly beaten in the Woolwich Cup Final by the Royal Logistics Corps. However, a strong finish to the season culminated in winning all three fixtures in the home Quads, running out as comprehensive winners. Post season has seen the team embarked on a major tour to Washington DC in the United States. The male team were only beaten by a strong professional development team from DC United, but crafted out good wins versus teams from the US Marine Corps, the US Navy and The Pentagon. The current squad boasts ten Army level players and the Army skipper. Of those ten, six were selected to represent the Combined Services.



(b) Female Team

Having also started off the season with an excellent pre-season training camp in Cyprus and a one all friendly draw with the REME, the ladies went into the new season with confidence. During the season the squad of players has grown and strengthened with some additions to the coaching and admin teams. The team results were five wins, three losses and one draw. The team finished as Semi Finalists in the Edward's Challenge Cup losing in extra time to the REME. The team also recorded wins against the Royal Engineers, Army Medical Services and HMS Chatham. The Royal Signals also hosted the end of season tournament; bad weather dictated a change to the format to a straight knock out competition. Unfortunately once again the team were beaten in the semi-finals by the REME, this time losing out on penalties. Post season the team attended the Royal Signals tour to Washington DC in the United States, this also included a number of female reservists. Matches were played against two competitive teams; firstly versus BRYCE Elite Academy, the score at the end being five goals to one to the home team. But they did feature five USA U20 players and one U15 player and finally against Arlington Thunder, with Arlington running out clear winners before bad weather halted play. The current squad boasts 3 Army level players, which is fantastic news.

(c) Reserve Team

The season did start slowly initially due to the lack of teams that could play on a weekend. However five of the players were picked for the Reserve National side and took part in a pre-season tour to Cyprus and one reservist travelled to the United States with the regular team at the end of the year. The team had a number of fixtures arranged against the Royal Logistics Corps Reserve side but unfortunately these were cancelled. Thankfully the team did manage to play in a charity match against Meriden Football Club on behalf of the Army Benevolent Fund and arranged another game against a civilian team called Longlevens from Cheltenham, both matches were won. The team has been supported the whole time by two coaching staff, WO1 (Bde SM) Moore and WO2 (MTWO) Middleton. They have had a regular squad of eighteen players from across 2 Signal Group units throughout the season.

NETBALL

A Corps training camp was held in April which attracted many new players. The Corps funded an England Netball coach for the week to try and raise the standard of training sessions. This was highly successful and received positive feedback from the players. The team has also focused heavily on strength and conditioning; the players were encouraged to maintain this as a discipline in preparation for future competitions (as well as being of obvious benefit for military physical training). For the first time, the team played a couple of friendly fixtures against the REME and the Royal Engineers; winning one and losing one. We entered two teams into the Inter-Corps comp. Whilst the team felt their final standings could be better, the motivation to play netball is spreading and they had four new players selected for Army level training.





This has been a very positive year for Royal Signals Netball whereby regular contact time (through friendly matches, training sessions, inter-unit comp and a tour to Malta) has achieved the goal of establishing a committed base of netballers with a galvanised sense of team spirit. The squad continues to benefit from some exceptional talent; most notably, Cpl Roberts of 30 Sig Regt and LCpl Buckley of ARTD who have been re-selected for Combined Services along side Sgts' Blackburn and Gledhill. We entered two teams into the 2015 Inter-Corps Comp and in both divisions performed exceptionally well. All in all a great year with much innovation and team building to set them up well for future seasons.

SNOWBOARDING

The sport of snowboarding is thriving at unit level and within the Corps. With an increase of roughly ten percent this season, and one hundred and forty six riders attending the Corps Camp, which was a real testament to its popularity. All this and ably supported and enabled by the Corps Committee of just nine volunteers.

Each of the competitions were particularly hard fought and close run, with the highlight again being the SBX competition, during which the competitors show particular courage and skill. Similarly the female competition was closely fought, but being somewhat lighter in competitors was somewhat limited.

At the Army level, the Corps Team again did extremely well finishing fourth overall, with some outstanding individual performances. It should be noted that many of our top riders were not available to attend, so the team finished much lower down the rankings than usual, but still the performance regardless bodes really well for the future.



THE FUTURE

As ever this report has been a small snapshot of what our sporting teams have been up to and what they have achieved over the last year. Their achievements never cease to amaze, with a multitude of representation across the disciplines from Combined Services to Great Britain. The flow of new talent never switches off and it's refreshing that this is still the case. The key to the successes you have read are in the selflessly committed, extremely motivated coaches, trainers and managers, without whom we could not possibly hope for the same success in the arena of sport. This must continue in the future in order to keep Corps sports team at the front where they should be.





Report by The Chairman of The Royal Signals Association

If 2014 was dominated by the remembrance of things beginning and in particular the centenary of the start of the First World War, 2015 was perhaps more characterised by things coming to an end. At a National level, we saw commemorations to mark the 70th anniversary of both VE- and VJ-Days and, on a smaller scale, the 20th anniversary of the end of the civil war in Bosnia.

Closer to home, the Corps marked two significant closures. The first was the demise of the final Royal Signals unit to be based in Catterick. When many of us joined the Army, such a turn of events would have seemed inconceivable, given the presence there of both the mighty Training Group and some of our finest Field Force units. (Indeed, both our President and I had the honour of commanding 19 Mechanized Brigade Headquarters and Signal Squadron during its time in Gaza Barracks.) But times change and in the Spring I was delighted to take part in a moving service in the Garrison (and former Corps) Chapel. During it a plaque was unveiled to mark the closure of the final unit and the old standard of the Catterick Branch of the RSA was laid up. Surprisingly, this standard becomes the very first ever to be laid up in the Catterick Chapel. For the sake of clarity, I should perhaps add that a few signallers do remain in Catterick, albeit on the establishment of a Military Intelligence unit. I am delighted that they, together with Catterick Branch, have agreed to look after the Corps memorabilia which are still scattered around the Garrison and, in particular, the Wood-Howes Memorial.

The second notable closure was the withdrawal of the Corps' final unit from Germany. Thus ended what was undoubtedly our longest ever deployment, lasting over 70 years from the dying days of the Second World War. Given its centrality to the development of the Corps, the Cold War and the British Army of the Rhine are remarkably under-represented in the Corps Museum

and this is something we are determined to correct whilst we can. The Corps Council and Museum Trustees have decided to mount a major new exhibition to capture the history and essence of our 70 years in Germany, which we hope will open in time for the Corps' centenary in 2020. What was it really like:

- To be manning a Rebro or Radio Relay detachment on the top of the Deister in the depths of a German winter?
- To be constantly ready for immediate deployment to crash sites within hours of "Active Edge" being called?
- To be part of the "hardening-and-reducing" trials, Ptarmigan system upgrades or the introduction of Bowman?
- To be out on exercise almost every month, sometimes for 4 or 5 weeks at a time?

These are not things which are well documented anywhere, but they do currently live on in the memories of many of us who served in Germany. We want to capture these memories whilst we still can and record them as oral history, accessible for future generations. And for that we need your help, both at Branch and individual level. We intend to launch the initiative at the Association's Annual General Meeting and this year's Blandford Reunion weekend. So please, do start dredging your memories, not just for tales of derring do, but also for incidents which typified life both in barracks and in the field.

Of course, 2016 also saw some new beginnings. The Corps' new Midland base reached fruition with the opening in the Autumn of enlarged and enhanced facilities in Beacon Barracks, Stafford by our Colonel-in-Chief. In addition to the three Regiments based in Stafford itself, the Corps Band now operates out of Cosford and both 30 and 37 Signal Regiments continue in their long-standing homes, making this the largest single concentration of Corps units and personnel in modern times. We are looking at ways in which the Association and its members can make use of this exciting new footprint.

Meanwhile we made a few changes to the format of the Blandford Reunion. In particular and in line with the Master's drive to bring the Regular, Reserve and Retired elements of the Corps (the "Three Rs") closer together, we held a combined parade and march past. Some were initially hesitant that we might be shown up by the new recruits of 11 Signal Regiment (or perhaps it was the other way round?), but in the event it all worked splendidly. I for one was proud to take part in this unique event which brought together the Corps' Past, Present and Future. We will as always continue to tweak the format in 2016 to ensure that we give the very best experience to everyone who makes the journey to Blandford, whether for the day or the entire weekend.

Finally may I once again thank all the Branches who have shown such great hospitality to Kathleen and me throughout the year. We continue to be amazed by the sheer variety and diversity of activities laid on by our Branches and Areas. It remains my intent to visit every Branch at least once during my tenure as your Chairman; so, if you haven't seen me yet, you have at least been warned!

May we wish you all a successful and healthy year ahead and look forward to seeing as many of you as possible during 2016.





Report by the Regimental Secretary

A huge amount has happened in RHQ over the last year and I would like to start by thanking those who have helped us

move to our new "Subscriber Customer Relationship Management" (Subscriber CRM) system by responding quickly to our requests for updated direct debit mandates and name/address information. It was, as I anticipated in my last report, a mammoth task but I am hugely proud of the RHQ team and the way in which it has dealt with the very busy routine domestic business of the Corps as well as delivering these enhancements and a new RSA/RSBF legal structure. Much of what I have to say in the rest of my report describes our progress but we are not finished yet and I ask that you continue to give the RHQ team your full backing as we continue to develop better and more efficient ways of supporting the serving and retired Corps:

• Subscriber CRM. We have completed the first part of our development and now have a much more accurate database with updated information on our membership and the removal of tens of thousands of expired records. Most of our working processes are now electronic and it has become far easier to make changes or contact you if we need to. Moreover, our benevolence grant system is no longer paper-based and this has enabled us to respond to Signallers in need much more quickly than ever before. However, Subscriber CRM is not yet web-facing and that remains our target over the next year. We are now moving into a phase where we are starting to test the ability for our members to make changes themselves through our website, www.royalsignals.org, and also to be able to book tickets for Corps events and pay on-line. The aim is to take time to get it right rather than to rush but I hope that, by the end of 2016, we will have a truly digital approach - as befits our Corps.

- Officers' Subscriptions. Thank you for your patience as we setup new direct debits and thank you for responding so well to the new approach to subscriptions, enabling you to opt in to just the benefits you want to use. I am also grateful for your acceptance of the new subscription rates having not reviewed them for a decade, the charity was losing money in every case and this could not continue. In future, we will review rates every 2 years, starting in 2017.
- Retired Officers' List (The Blue List). Thank you for your patience in accepting a one-year delay on producing this list while we introduced Subscriber CRM. We have, inevitably, been reviewing the future of the list given the current security situation but it is still our intention, having taken advice from our local MI Battalion, to produce it in 2016. The Blue List is a free publication but, as I highlighted in my report last year, we do need your updated approval if you want us to publish your name and details in the next list. This was sought through the returns we sent out to set up the new RO subscriptions so if you have not responded then I'm afraid that we cannot include you. We will be writing to those who have not replied once more and there will be an on-line "tick-box" once we become webfacing. There is one other major change, which is that we will now produce the list in autumn 2016, partly because it seems more logical to send out updated information in the run up to Christmas but also, sadly, because the sudden demise of our Head of Publications and Wire Editor, Maj (Retd) Keith Pritchard, will make the publication of a spring 2016 list unachievable.
- Royal Signals Trustee Ltd (RSTL). RSA members will be aware that we have been working to bring the legal relationship of the RSA and RSBF up to date under the governance of a single corporate trustee, RSTL. I am very pleased to report that the Charity Commission gave its approval to the formal registration of the RSA as a charity in November and followed this almost immediately with approval to run the RSA and RSBF together in financial terms under a "uniting direction". This is a major milestone in an important piece of work I have been pursuing since I became Regimental Secretary in 2010 and means that we are now properly governed for a 21st Century Charity. There has been little impact on the way in which RSA branches operate as was the intent.
- Legacies. With a reduced number of serving soldiers, we rely heavily on investment income to enable us to balance our books as one day's pay scheme income is not sufficient to that task. We just about break even most years and, with a volatile stock market, the RSTL Board remains concerned that we are facing a deficit in future years. It was for this reason that we now employ a Marketing Officer on a part-time basis and it is already very clear that some of the biggest donations to the charity come in the form of generous legacies. We advertise this regularly in the Wire and RSI Journal but I would like to take this opportunity to thank those who already plan to remember their Corps in their will and also to encourage anyone thinking about taking this step to do so.

As you can see, we have done a lot in the last 12 months. There is more to do but I believe that we have now a very firm technical foundation on which to run our domestic business in the future and this will make life easier for all of us.




More from Dorset Branch AGM 2016
